take advantage of the library as "the classroom to the entire school"	provide flexible learning spaces for students, teachers, and the whole school community

LESS THAN 1/3 OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS HAVE A LICENSED SCHOOL LIBRARIAN

- Only 31% of Hawai'i's 257 public department (DOE) schools have a licensed school librarian (arch.k12.hi.us/reports/ssir)
- This means only 39% of DOE students attend a school with a licensed school librarian
- Many schools have outdated libraries and rely on fundraisers to purchase library materials

WHAT NEEDS TO HAPPEN

- Supplement weighted student formula so all students have a licensed school librarian and an up-to-date library
- School administrators should hire a licensed school librarian and allocate funds for updated, relevant library resources

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Issue a resolution on the value of strong school libraries and licensed school librarians
- Consider legislation that addresses equitable student access to well-resourced and staffed school libraries
- Consider successful state bipartisan legislation (such as NJ S588 2023) which requires instruction on information literacy
